HISTORY WAS MADE!

SPRINGFIELD, MASSACHUSETTS — 1789 A small bay colt named Figure is born; his parentage veiled in mystery. The colt had an ordinary, even humble beginning. But in the coming years, the accomplishments of the stallion became legendary.

He earned his keep by clearing wooded mountainsides in Vermont. After a full day of work he could still out walk, trot, and run his challengers, under saddle or in harness. His gaits were strong, ground-covering, perfect for traveling long distances in the new world. And his willingness to take on new challenges established his value with men who appreciated a good horse. A working horse with a demeanor of royalty, Figure was as beautiful as he was functional. And he passed all of these wonderful characteristics on to his offspring.

He was the "Justin Morgan Horse," named after the Vermont music teacher who owned him, and he founded America's first breed of horse. Twenty generations later, our Morgans today still exhibit his extraordinary traits.

To know the Morgan you must look into his face—gaze into his intelligent, kind eyes and you will see a true friend who is willing to lend you his courage, his good sense, his winning attitude.

The Morgan is easily recognized by his proud carriage, upright graceful neck, and distinctive head with expressive eyes. Deep bodied and compact, the Morgan has strongly muscled quarters. The intelligence, willingness, zest for life, and good sense of the Morgan is blended with soundness of limb, athleticism, and stamina. The Morgan horse is free moving and calm under western tack or elegant and aristocratic ridden in English style. A tractable temperament allows the Morgan to excel when driving in single or multiple hitches. Companionable and comfortable on a quiet pleasure rider, the Morgan can go anywhere open skies beckon, working as a sensible partner for a long day of ranch work or endurance riding. Waiting alert and ready to enter the show ring, or performing in formal riding disciplines, the Morgan is a versatile breed. The Morgan horse agreeably adapts to his owner's lifestyle. The first American breed can be found worldwide. Reliable, loyal, and tireless, a Morgan becomes one with people of all ages and walks of life, sharing the mutual enjoyment in every equine pastime.

The Morgan horse is known for many things, his extreme heart, his willingness and intellect, and his athleticism and versatility; the American Morgan Horse Association (AMHA) is here to preserve, promote, and protect this wonderful horse.

Founded in 1909, the Morgan Horse Club was formed to support the Morgan breed. As the breed grew, the Club evolved with it and in 1971 underwent a reorganization to reflect its blossoming responsibilities. Its permanent headquarters was established in Shelburne, Vermont, in 1988. The headquarters also is home to the National Museum of the Morgan Horse, whose exhibits display the past and future of this great breed.

The Registry exists to maintain and ensure the records of the Morgan Horse Register. It works in tandem with breeders to uphold the soundness of all Morgan horse breeding records. In 1927, the first registration certificates were issued and to date, more than 170,000 Morgan horses have been registered.

The breed journal, *The Morgan Horse*, was introduced to the public in 1941 as a newsletter. Now a four-color publication, the magazine continues more than 65 years later to be a source that is instrumental in reflecting and introducing the Morgan to a worldwide audience.


